Therefore our mission is to educate youth and adults about how to partner with their environment through sustainable agriculture. Our educational programs will promote opportunities for economic development and will strengthen the health of our community.

A gift to Gathering Ground is a gift to support educational programs in sustainable agriculture, including the creation of a garden for use by the Island School students, teachers, & community members.

In 2018, we will also begin pioneering a low-impact vineyard management program for Northern Hybrid vineyards in the Midwest. With the help of experts from around the region, we believe our pilot program for sustainable grape management will prove to be a resource for grape growers across the midwest who wish to to grow grapes, but don't want to use so many environmentally harmful fungicides and pesticides.

We are excited by what this end of the year giving will mean for Gathering Ground. If we receive \$15,000 in gifts from individuals, and \$15,000 from our matching donor, we will be able to jump start our programs in meaningful ways in the next year.



With more than 60 volunteers from the Island, Milwaukee, Chicago, Green Bay and elsewhere, we were able to harvest 8,000 pounds of grapes. It was so much fun to chat and pick in the vineyard. 

Our Financial Review & Outlook

Our first year financials reflect an organization establishing a firm foundation. The vast majority of our expenses in 2017 were one-time, startup costs associated with establishment of Gathering Ground as a 501(c)3. This amount was \$5,474, and was covered by an anonymous donation. The cost to produce the grapes (\$732) was kept low due to the donation of people's time and equipment. Our fixed annual costs included utilities (\$367) and insurance (\$778). Finally, \$353 in consulting fees went to covering the travel expenses of organic fruit-growing expert Judy Reith, who donated her consultation.

With \$13,273 of retained donations and earnings as of December 1, 2017, our financial outlook for 2018 is promising and will permit us to continue to work toward pioneering a path in Wisconsin for environmentally friendly vineyard management. We are also excited about the programs we can begin in 2018—from the community and school garden to the establishment of community fruit and nut orchards. With the matching donation of up \$15,000 that is on offer through to the end of December, 2017, the possibilities for Gathering Ground are extremely exciting.

Our focus is on community. Gathering Ground exists to bring people together around sustainable agriculture, to facilitate educational opportunities for youth and the community, and to work toward economic development in agriculture on Washington Island. Join us in our mission!
